RE: TIGER Grant Letter of Support - City of Port Orchard, Washington:
Gorst Transportation Corridor Planning Study

Dear Sir or Madam,

I am writing to support the City of Bremerton's TIGER grant application for the corridor transportation planning effort within the Gorst area of Kitsap County, Washington, which is located between the City of Port Orchard and the City of Bremerton along Sinclair Inlet. Traffic within the Gorst area is rapidly exceeding the capacity of the current system during both the morning and evening commutes, causing significant travel delays for workers and visitors. This critical transportation corridor links Mason and Kitsap Counties with I-5 and is at the Junction of SR-16 and SR-3. Kitsap County is home to over one-third of the region's defense workforce of more than 15,000 employees and 5,000 defense contract workers, with a combined payroll of over \$1.5 billion per year. In addition to linking the cities within Kitsap County to Mason and Pierce counties, the Gorst corridor provides access to the many installations of Naval Base Kitsap, home to the 20,000 workers noted above. Closely adjacent to the west, SR-3 serves the South Kitsap Industrial Area (SKIA), one of only eight designated Manufacturing/Industrial Centers (MIC's) within the Central Puget Sound Region. This important regional designation is conferred by the Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC). SKIA is expected to be home to 10,000 additional jobs within the next 20 years.

This planning effort is strongly supported by the State of Washington, as well as local jurisdictions as evidenced by a \$500,000 planning effort, funded by the State of Washington to improve the SR-3/SR-304 interchange serving Naval Base Kitsap. Furthermore, several other agencies, such as Kitsap Transit, the City of Bremerton, the Port of Bremerton, Kitsap County and the Washington State Department of Transportation, recently collaborated to provide the necessary grant match on a \$454,000 federal study of the Gorst corridor. In total, this partnership provided \$54,000 to ensure the study effort could go forward.

This TIGER grant planning effort will take the output of the study efforts listed above, and complete an Interchange Justification Report (IJR), thus providing the foundational basis for the final NEPA work. Thank you for your time and consideration in this combined effort.
